
Hyperbole and a Half: Unfortunate Situations, Flawed Coping Mechanisms, Mayhem, and Other Things That Happened, by 28-year-old Allie Brosh, who wrote and drew a cartoony blog with crude bug-eyed characters for a couple years that eventually grew to have a huge following, mostly among the under-40s. Topics range from whether her dog is retarded, fun things to do with a brick, and to the topic that skyrocketed her popularity: her unflinching portrayal of numbing depression. New and improved e-readers are here and the two big contenders are **Kindle Paperwhite** (Amazon) and **Nook GlowLight** (Barnes & Noble), both at **\$119** and offering easier-on-the-eyes backlighting, matte screens that don't glare in the sun, and longer battery life. They also are thinner/lighter. **The Kobo Touch** e-reader is in the same price range. Add a colorful protective cover (as little as \$13) and make sure you've got a power adapter. 




The Reason I Jump: The Inner Voice of a Thirteen-Year-Old Boy with Autism by Naoki Higashida, translated by David Mitchell (father of an autistic child). Smart and self-aware, Naoki answered 58 questions using an alphabet grid to painstakingly construct words, sentences, and thoughts he can't speak out loud. Said the Chicago Tribune: "This is an intimate book, one that brings readers right into an autistic mind — what it's like without boundaries of time, why cues and prompts are necessary, and why it's so impossible to hold someone else's hand ... by listening to this voice, we can understand its echoes." 
The Bully Pulpit: Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft, and the Golden Age of Journalism, by historian Doris Kearns Goodwin. Warning: With 928 pages, it weighs three pounds. It's about the presidencies of Theodore Roosevelt and his successor, William Howard Taft — one-time friends who became sworn foes. Goodwin also chronicles the birth of an activist press, which occurred when some terrific journalists converged at McClure's magazine; their work helped usher in the Progressive era. **Amazon: \$24; \$13.99 Kindle; \$24.41 MP3 CD**. 


Each image is accompanied by directions, related Web sites, and historical facts, and Adams offers tips for capturing the best image. November's Fury: The Deadly Great Lakes Hurricane of 1913, by Michael Schumacher, an expert on Great Lakes shipwrecks and lighthouses. Twelve ships sunk, 31 were grounded on rocks or beaches, and 250 men lost their lives in this freak hurricane that lasted three days and whipped up waves of 40 feet. It's well-written, with accounts of daring rescues, amazing survivals, and plenty of photos. About **\$19** at **Books-A-Million**, **Barnes & Noble**.



A dozen local history books are at the **Libbey Glass Outlet** adjacent to the Toledo Farmers' Market (still open on Saturday mornings). Books on Toledo's railroads, architecture, baseball, hockey, Polish community, glass-making, and Ohio's wineries, are there along with **Toledo: Our Life, Our Times, Our Town** (photobooks, Vol. II and III still available, **\$14.99**), and **You'll Do Better in Toledo** (early postcards of the city, **\$14.99**). The latter two, published by The Blade, can be bought at **The Blade** building downtown, 541 N. Superior St. Most of the others are paperbacks priced at less than **\$30**, and are also available at bookstores.



40 Chances, by Howard G. Buffett who has the extraordinary happenstance to be son of one of the world's richest men.
