nabi 2 Kids Tablet or nabi Nick Jr. Kids Tablet — Both are available at Target and Best Buy. The nabi 2 Kids Tablet is WiFi capable, has 8GB on-board storage memory, a 7-inch screen, over 100 software applications for kids and parents, a 2 megapixel camera, Bluetooth, and media player. Costs \$179.99. The nabi Nick Jr. is smaller with a 5-inch screen and 4GB storage. Costs \$139.99. Both seem durable and packed with games — some even educational.

Ugly Stik Shakespeare rod and reel — What kid doesn't like impaling a worm with a sharp hook and tricking a fish into thinking it's a safe meal? There are various versions of kids' fishing rods available at most major retailers. Target carries an Ugly Stik that comes with

multiple lures and line for \$28.99.



Spalding Polycarbonate Portable Basketball System 50 — Boys and girls from 2 to 18 like to shoot hoops. This basketball system's height is adjustable up to 10 feet. It has a 50-inch steel-framed polycarbonate backboard, is sturdy, and has two attached wheels that make it easy to maneuver. It's available at multiple locations but seems a good deal at Target on sale for \$179, down from \$219.

Exo Terra Nano Terrarium — What kid doesn't love reptiles or amphibians? This housing, designed by herpetologists, has front-opening doors to allow easy access, front-window ventilation, and a natural background included. The downside is you will also be buying and caring for a reptile or amphibian, probably by Dec. 26. Get that new family member at Pet Supplies Plus or Petco. The terrarium is widely available online but also at Trilby Tropicals, 4853 Monroe St. for \$42.99.

DBK Express and DBK Equinox adjustable quad roller skates — Old school is new school. Boys and girls love to skate. Dick's Sporting Goods at Franklin Park Mall has just a few quads in stock but a large selection of inline skates. The DBK

comes in pink and black. \$64.99

This indoor/outdoor remote control helicopter has dual counter-rotating rotors, internal gyroscope technology, and digital proportional controls for stability. Basically, it flies up/down, left/right, and forward/backward. Get it at RadioShack on sale for \$59.99, down from \$69.99.
